2016 - 2017 has been one of our most successful seasons in rugby. Three County Cups and a National Plate Semi-Final were more than could be hoped for back in September.

I would like to thank the coaches, parents and students for their hard work in continuing to keep Crossley Heath firmly at the forefront of school rugby in the region. On only 2 previous occasions has any school won 3 titles in one year - in both 2010 and 2012 a little grammar school from Halifax achieved the same feat! Back in those days we had 6 cups to aim for rather than 4, so this year is even more special.

County Finals day started with the U15s against Horsforth School, Leeds. As returning champions, Crossley's were reasonably confident that if they played well they should retain the title. Horsforth however, made them work hard for their victory, particularly early on, where the Crossley's boys had to defend for significant periods. Once parity of possession was achieved, Crossley's showed their class and despite occasional spells of pressure, emerged as comfortable winners.

On paper, the U16 had a tougher task ahead of them, having lost out to Ripon, their opponents, in the quarter final the year before. A quick score early on steadied nerves and the Crossley Heath boys began to control the game through their half backs, with strong running across the team creating problems for Ripon's defence. Whilst Ripon had occasional brief periods of dominance, Crossley's never looked like losing the game and in spite of a couple of squandered scoring chances still emerged as comfortable winners.

The U18 final was a very difficult game to call as both teams had key players playing in the U16 game. This required Crossley's to call up a number of boys no longer playing for school to the ranks. In spite of their early retirements, these boys still showed that they were quality players and had a positive impact on the game. In the end we were far too strong for Ripon and were comfortable winners.

A big thank you to the boys who stepped up and enabled us to retain our title.

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CHARITY ROUND UP

Since the Christmas break our charity work has continued with three main events from January to March. First of all we supported a charity endeavour very close to our hearts here at Crossley Heath - World Cancer Day. Sales of their new 'Unity Bands' allowed us to raise £100 to send to this very important cause.

Into February and our Y7 students embarked upon the annual support for Lepra, the charity which works with sufferers of leprosy worldwide. Our students were asked to gain sponsorship in creative ways and rose to the challenge by doing a host of activities. Some gave up talking for a day, some gave up electronic devices for the weekend, some did household chores and others did bike rides, walks and sponsored runs. Collectively they managed to raise a whopping £2819.56 with particularly outstanding efforts from Mahima Hussain in 7D who alone raised £100.16, Saran Thiara in 7E who raised £207.00 and Hafsa Khalil in 7D who raised £300.12 – amazing contributions! All students who raised over £25 were presented with a certificate and gift from Lepra (presented to them by Debbie Richards, the regional Lepra representative) and those who raised over £50 also received a gold medal.



Finally, and most recently, we held a non-uniform day at the end of March and raised £961.66 which was split between 2 charities: £250 was sent to the National Autistic Society (as part of last week's World Autism Awareness week) and the remaining £711.66 went to Comic Relief.

Our current overall Charity total is now £7401.27, which is a phenomenal amount. Again, we cannot thank you all enough for your continued ongoing support!


ROTARY TOURNAMENT



MINDFULNESS AND YOGA FOR WELLBEING

'Mindfulness and Yoga for Wellbeing' was introduced to the KS4 PE curriculum five years ago. Mrs Jowett, who is the Wellbeing and Support Coordinator, is a qualified 'TeenYoga' Instructor and she teaches a weekly mindfulness and yoga lesson to Y10 and Y11 girls.

Mrs Jowett says "Yoga is a technology for wellbeing: it is an incredibly powerful tool for improving emotional and physical health. It is both a preventative and a therapeutic strategy, helping young people build resilience to cope with stress now and in the future.



Mrs Jowett explains the benefits of mindfulness and yoga: "The students can arrive feeling stressed and irritable. We practise yoga sequences that improve strength and flexibility, as well as twists and balances that improve focus and boost energy levels. After a mindful relaxation, the students feel relaxed, calm and in the mood to learn - although some find the greatest challenge can be not talking!"

Their season has been very inconsistent and they have struggled to hit the high quality performances they are capable of at key times. The team are continuing to improve and under the guidance of Mr O'Connor next year their individual ability, work ethic and squad cohesion will lead to them achieving their full potential. BIATHLON

A massive well done to Y7 student Verity Clements who competed in the British Schools Modern Biathlon Championships at Crystal Palace on 25 March. The Girls' Competition timetable was scheduled in for the whole day as there were hundreds of competitors from schools all across the country and nearly 90 competitors in Verity's Under 13 section. Verity was bracketed in middle range heats for both swimming and running. In her swimming heat in lane 6 she came 2nd, only a fingertip behind the winner. Her time of 1min 21.76 seconds was a PB for the 100 metre distance. After everyone had swum Verity was placed 68th out of the whole field - a good effort considering the athletic talent that was at the event. In her running heat of the 1600 metres Verity started in the outside lane which wasn't the best draw. However during the race she moved from the back of the field to finish strongly, sprinting after and closing on the 2nd and 3rd placed runners in the home straight and nearly catching them. Her time in 4th place of 6min 9 seconds was again a personal best for the distance. This run moved Verity nine places up the leader board to finish a respectable 59th in her first attempt at this event.



In what was a highly successful season (see front page), the U15's biggest disappointment was in their loss to Dame Allen's school in Newcastle in the National Plate. A disallowed try in the final minute and a missed conversion would both have carried them through to the last 8. In a squad full of talented players, everyone is now stepping up and contributing to the team's success as they become more cohesive. Many of the squad will be in contention for regular First XV rugby next season. Player of the Year was Asiece Lalli and Most Improved Player was Matthew Holden. Jacob Pollard was awarded the Junior Player of the Year Award as the most influential performer across Y7 to 11.

Under 16 rugby largely revolves around First and Second XV matches every week. This year a significant number of boys have stepped up and made an enormous contribution to the success of both senior teams. They have also had the disappointment of last year's Yorkshire Cup defeat in their minds and have made amends for this in no uncertain fashion. Toby Spooner was awarded Player of the Year and Most Improved Player went to Isaac Mitchell.
