I have thoroughly enjoyed my time here and will take away many very happy memories of the school and the people in it.

When I took up the post, I wanted to run a happy and

successful school in which teachers could teach to the best of their ability and where students wanted to learn and be the best they could be. I also wanted to show people that Crossley Heath is truly a Calderdale school with lots to offer the local community and other schools. The recent Y9 Citizenship Day showed that we are encouraging young people

undertake projects that can make a difference to our community and beyond. The 2 winners put forward causes which will leave a legacy - 9B's project on men's mental health with Andy's Man Club and 9C's project with St Augustine's to create a refugee welcoming school. Brilliant!

When I started my first job in the 1980's at Bemrose School in Derby, little did I know where I would end up. This was a tough school but it gave me a good grounding in pastoral care which has been important to me ever since. Family reasons brought me back to Calderdale

where I have worked ever since, firstly to Haugh Shaw Secondary School and then to Rastrick High School. I ioined Crossley Heath because I felt there was a job to do and I was confident I could do it. Taking on the headship under quite difficult



circumstances, is a decision I have never regretted. One thing I have loved about this school is the history and heritage and meeting the different groups associated with the school such as Heath Old Boys' and the Old Crosslevans. I soon realised, though, that in this small Calderdale world everyone seems to know everyone else and have an opinion!

It is impossible to thank everyone personally in this newsletter but I am grateful

for the support I have had from Crossley Heath Governing Body, a very able and committed group of volunteers who always put the needs of the school first. The senior leadership team that I have worked closely with has provided support, challenge and debate over the years, as well as a great deal of friendship. My PA, Lynne, has

been truly amazing and her knowledge of the school cannot b e emphasised enough. I have been always impressed by the dedication of the staff here - their commitment and lovalty to the school and students is very strong and I shall miss working with

them. First and foremost, the students here are exceptional and I wish each and every one of you success and happiness for the future.

I am taking 12 months out now to travel and see something of the world but I shall stay in touch from a distance. This school means a lot to me and I shall never forget it - or you.

WORLD RECORD FOR MAX

In April, he set a new European Age 14 record

(1:52.08) at Stretford, to go with the European Age 13 record (1:57.4), which he set at the County Championships last year. In May he ran 1:50.04 at Sportcity, Manchester, setting a new British Age 15 record, which he broke again at a BMC meeting in Trafford in June, setting a new World Age 15 record of 1:49.42 (a record which had stood since 2000). He won the Yorkshire County Championship U17 800m in May and last week came second in the English Schools Inter Boys 800m in his first year in this age group. This result qualified him to represent England in an International Schools event in

Dublin this weekend – the youngest member of the England team. In this competition, he ran hard and beat the boy who had nipped ahead of him in the closing straight in the English Schools Championships, to finish first overall, as British Champion, another fantastic achievement. And last but not least, he came from last position to win the last leg of the 4 x 400m relay at the school sports day! Well done. Max, we are extremely proud of your achievements in athletics this year.

GERMAN EXCHANGE

At the beginning of July, the return part of the German exchange took place. 26 students and 2 teachers from our partner school the Viktoriaschule in Aachen spent a week in Halifax with their partners in Y10. They enjoyed trips to York, Manchester, Bradford, Haworth and met the mayor at the town hall. On the last day they also participated in lessons at school. Some really strong friendships have been formed and tears were shed when we finally waved them goodbye!





"It was great that the History department launched a brand new trip this year for A-Level students. We travelled to Berlin at the end of June and over the course of four days covered a very busy itinerary, visiting numerous museums, a concentration camp, Checkpoint Charlie and even a nuclear bunker under the centre of Berlin. We enjoyed seeing things relevant to parts of the 'A' Level course that we have covered so far, like sections of the museums about the economy and the First World War. We also found the concentration camp and bunker very interesting and look forward to learning more about these back in school. It was also

great that as Sixth Form students we had some freedom to explore the city and spend some

time in smaller groups."


in their future studies. We also would like to wish Chris Pickles all the best in his retirement. His support for the Music department within school and on school trips has been so appreciated and he will be truly missed.





ATHLETICS Following their fantastic performances earlier in the season we took the Y9/10 girls and the Y7/8 boys to Wakefield to compete in the English Schools Athletics regional B final.

It was a fantastic day and some of our students performed at their best.

Some notable performances were from Maisie Burton in the 100m, with a time of 13.3, Isabel Castelow in the 800m with a time of 2min 17. Lauryn Gregg in the 1500m with a time of 5min 09 seconds, Lucy Whearty in the 1500m with a time of 5min 17 sec and Danielle Pope clearing 1.47m in the high jump. Some other fantastic performances came from Anna Brierley, Emma Wardle, Cara Casson, Emily Manderson, Robin Casey and Lucy Bowler. The girls achieved a point score of 286 placing them 1st in the North Midlands Regional B final, which is a fantastic achievement.



In the Y7-8 boys there were some notable performances from Ted Grogan in the high jump, clearing 1.29m, Adil Haider in the long jump at 4.45m and Danny Baxter in the 1500m running 5.21m. Well done to the rest of the team who also put in some solid performances, including Henry Henderson, Sam Mindham, Raj Palet, Seb Fahey, Benedict Freeman, Jamie Pridgeon, Tobias Gibson, Henry Hepworth, Alex Thompson and John Baker. The boys finished in 8th place overall.

We also took the Y7/8 team of girls to Nottingham to compete in the regional A final. They faced some tough opposition, competing against some of the best schools in the North Midlands region. Some notable performances were from Isabel Richardson who ran the 1500m in 5min 15 and Iris Palmer in 5min 20.

There were also some strong performances in the field events with Anna Nevison throwing 7.68m and Niamh Woodhouse throwing 18.59 in the discus. There was a great team effort from all the girls that competed this included Olivia Bowker, Charlotte Margetson, Tegan Hamilton Adams, Ava Jackson Isabella O'Toole, Olive Davison, Olivia Greenwood and Daisy Sheppard. They achieved a total points score of 297 placing them in 6th place overall.



Y7 ATHLETICS We took a team of 8 girls and 8 boys to compete in the Calderdale team event. There were some good performances but it was a tough competition as it took place at the start of term when a lot of our students had barely touched a javelin or jumped over a high jump. Our lack of experience showed but what the girls and boys lacked in technique they made up for in effort and they did Crossley Heath proud. They finished 6th overall which we hope to improve on next year once they have all had a bit more experience at the various events.

Y8-10 Calderdale Athletics was a culmination of a great season. There were some outstanding performances from all the athletes that took part, but special mention goes to Max Burgin, our very own world record holder, who convincingly won the 800m. We won and placed highly in a number of other events and the culmination of the boys' and girls' results put us in 2nd place

overall behind Rastrick. It was a fantastic end to the athletics season.

Well done to Max and Isabel Castelow who competed at the English Schools Athletics Finals. This is a fantastic achievement to have made it to this competition and we were very proud that they could represent the school at this level. Isabel felt a little under par on the day so did not run as well as she would have wanted but she still achieved a good placing in her heat. Max Burgin qualified for the final and came 2nd overall.

TENNIS The tennis teams have had successful season this year. with each age group either finishing first or second in their respective Aegon LTA leagues. The U13 girls finished as runners up in their league ahead o f Rishworth School behind and Holmfirth High School. The U13 boys won their



league after beating Rishworth and Holmfirth High school, but then losing narrowly to Hipperholme Grammar and have qualified for the Regional round of the B division competition to be held in Leeds in September.

The U15 girls have had an excellent season, finishing as overall league winners in their league after beating Bradford Grammar and Holmfirth High convincingly. They have also qualified for the Regional round of the division A competition in September. The U15 girls squad also reached the semi finals of the National knockout competition, where they played South Hunsley in a close and exciting matches.



Unfortunately on this occasion our team lost the match following a shoot out, which was a great achievement as they were playing girls much older than themselves. The U 15 boys team finished in 2nd place in their league, after beating Woodhouse Grove and Holmfirth High and then losing to a strong team from Bradford Grammar.
