At the beginning of term we welcomed our Y 7 and Y12 students who have settled in brilliantly to become part of our Crossley Heath family. We also celebrated our fantastic exam results: the amazing success of our Y11 students with the new, 'harder' GCSEs and the success of our Y13 students in achieving their A-levels and moving on to their chosen destinations.

Since then, we have made considerable strides towards making our school the very best it can be. We have developed, in consultation with staff, parents, students and governors, a new three year vision which will be available to view on our website in the New Year. At its heart is the determination to be a truly warm and inclusive community and to enhance our care of our children. We have already made strides towards this ambition. The A Level Physicists have been out and about this term. In October a group of staff and students went to see *First Man* at the cinema. After a food-stop at the obligatory Nandos and Pizza Express, they all met up to watch the acclaimed film which covered the life of NASA astronaut Neil Armstrong and the Apollo 11 mission to the moon in

1969. All reports were that it is a film well worth catching.

A month later, on 28 November a group of students travelled over to Leeds University for the annual Bolton Lecture in Physics. This year the subject was "Formation of Stars: A journey through cosmic time". The lecture was the best attended yet with

hundreds of people coming out on a wet November evening to hear the speaker from Cardiff University.

Students rounded off their trip with some food from the lovely German Christmas markets and others stopped off at Five Guys for a well-earned burger.

Crossley Heath celebrated diversity with its Interfaith Week for students and Community Celebration event for families, guests and other members of the local community. The theme of light was adopted for the week, a theme which most faiths and cultures have in common. Guest speakers delivered assemblies on Islam, Christianity and Hinduism and the connection to the theme of light. Students had the opportunity to debate various topics during form time and staff were encouraged to adopt the theme during lessons. Y7 students visited the Madni Mosque and St Paul's Church and learned about the customs and practices within both places of worship and had a warm welcome from both establishments.

Our celebration evening was a varied and colourful event with guests, again, adopting the theme of light. Representatives from the

Jewish, Islam, Christian and Hindu faiths all shared their experiences and a Humanist shared his viewpoint on why light is so important. Activities included the lighting of a menorah candle and sharing of food as part of the Hanukkah festival of light, prayers and discussion, as well as singing and Indian dancing. Finally, guests were treated to an uplifting song called 'My Lighthouse' performed by a member of a Christian band. It was a very interesting and enjoyable evening and a real treat to have so many cultures coming together to share and celebrate differences and commonalities.

Finally, the school's charity committee raised £128.37 at the annual Christmas Market for St Augustine's by selling sweets and doing henna designs.

December has kicked off with the annual Rotary Shoebox Appeal with 45 boxes given to the appeal; also a bake sale during Interfaith week raised £45.35 for St Augustine's and the non-uniform day raised £910.45 for the Welcome Centre in Huddersfield and Calderdale Age UK to be split evenly.

Enterprise Challenge

The tasks involved researching locations and finding out about the culture of the country, identifying suitable courses to offer, designing a logo, creating an advertising campaign, costing the project and basically all elements of a business plan.

Our team 'The Seoul of Asia' were chosen to go to London to represent the school at the National Finals. This event will be attended by the rich and famous as well as influential people in the business world. It could lead to the students being involved in the project up until its inception. We are very excited by this and the decision was well deserved with the students' performance leaving the judges speechless. Well done to Lexi Crossley, Roan Richmond, Amina Ali, Jonny Seagrave and Georgianna Smith. We wish them lots of luck for the national finals!
